Teens Explore Healthy Foods in Hands-on Lesson

For MIKE Program, it's one of the life lessons in empowering youth toward healthy behaviors. MIKE equips youth with the knowledge and skills to analyze food labels and nutrient content to make better decisions about the foods they consume.

MIKE Youth take in a Compelling View of Kidney Failure

The team at Fresenius Kidney Care Rose Quarter eagerly hosted MIKE youth at their clinic to provide an insightful look at the causes and effects of kidney failure this month. As part of MIKE's programming, the study of the kidney helps youth understand the importance of long-term health, as well as the impact of chronic diseases that lead to kidney failure.

The Fresenius team presented the youth with an overview of their jobs and why youth could consider entering into any of their various career fields. Ben Spencer expressed how nursing became a passion for him as a career change. Patric D'haem detailed his knowledge of nutrition as a renal dietician and Nakyah Kennerly invited the youth to consider entering the health care field as a patient care technician. "The training is very extensive, but it's all paid by Fresenius," she told the youth. "I love everything about my job—from the patients and my co-workers to the hours."

MIKE Board of Directors member Steve Kelley, who is the social worker at the clinic, has hosted dozens of tours for MIKE youth over the years. He tells the youth that his job is important as it helps people transition into dialysis, which is a life-long process without a kidney transplant. "I like to be with people on their journeys," he says. "I become part of their lives as I work with them to connect them to resources. It's an emotional time, especially at the beginning. So if I can lighten their day, I feel good about that."

This fall, I have the honor of introducing to you Caitlin Everett, the newest Director on MIKE's Board. Caitlin is the Beaverton School District Teacher on Special Assignment, where she directs the science and STEM programs. She also serves on the district Equity Leadership Team. With nine years of middle and high school science teaching experience, she is the former Professional Development and **Projects Coordinator for Portland Metro STEM** Partnership and a lead developer of the Patterns High School Science Curriculum, an open-source curriculum currently used in approximately one third of Oregon's high school science classrooms.

Caitlin writes: I support MIKE's mission because the health of our society hinges on the health and wellbeing of its citizens. Health disparities are a risk to the economic and social wellbeing of our historically underserved communities.

As an educator, I have seen the impacts of poor health and wellbeing first-hand. Three years ago, I learned that a young woman I had taught, just one year after she graduated, died of complications from Type II diabetes. Her death was tragic and preventable.

In thinking deeply about my role as an educator, and my role as a potential ally to underserved youth, I felt compelled to do more to promote health, and empower youth who may otherwise feel that diabetes, high blood pressure, and all the complications that come with those diseases, are inevitable. I believe MIKE has the mentoring, education, and organizational power to improve outcomes for the youth it serves. That is why I joined the Board.

A Living Memorial: Michael Hartnett, MD

MIKE Program serves as a living memorial to Michael N. Hartnett, MD. Dr. Hartnett embodied the best of the wisdom, caring, kindness and convictions of those he left behind.

MIKE Program is a result of the collaboration among his colleagues, friends and family. Dr. Hartnett was the

first board-certified nephrologist in Oregon and practiced from 1975 until his retirement in 1998. He died of lymphoma in 2000. He was 58 years old.
